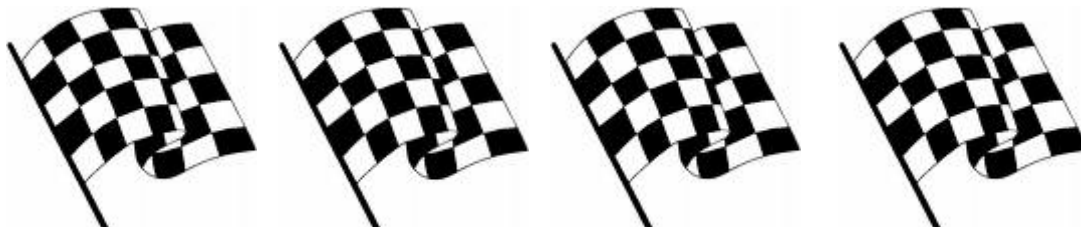

Don't miss out on a fun and rewarding opportunity!

The New Blue – Attention All Gardeners and Berry Pie Lovers.

There is a new kid (berry) on the rise. Watch out for *Lonicera caerulea* sp. After many years of research at the University of Saskatchewan, this Russian blue honeysuckle has proven to survive the Canadian prairie climate. The details: hardy, uniform, non-suckering shrub plant, with spring flowers producing mid summer blue oval shaped fruit. The Blue Honeysuckle is known to withstand extremely cold temperatures without dieback and still produce a good yield!

If you like blueberries (which are tough to grow) and raspberries, then you

will love this honeysuckle. It does require pollination from another honeysuckle so you must have two – a male and a female - to produce fruit.

There seems to be no limits to what you may do with these berries. Canning, freezing, drying, juice, jams jellies and of course my favorite – pies. Needless to say; eating them fresh off the bush is great too...just get there before the cedar waxwings and other winged friends that will enjoy them as much as you do.

Watch for the new varieties in local garden centers.
