5 Tips for Winterizing your Home

Let's face it – Edmonton winters are COLD. The more you can do to keep the cold out of your home, the warmer you'll feel, and the more money you'll save! In no particular order, here are the top five things you can do to prepare your home for winter:

- Insulation Upgrade your attic and/or basement insulation. A lot of heat is lost in these areas. By adding more insulation, you'll not only feel warmer in winter, your house will stay cooler in summer too.
- Caulking & Weather-stripping Find out where your home leaks air – windows, doorframes, sills and joints. Seal or caulk the gaps and use weather-stripping on windows and doors. By reducing air leakage, you'll keep the cold air out and the warm air in!
- Drapes & Blinds Open up south facing drapes and blinds on sunny days to allow the sunlight to warm your rooms. Close them at night to keep drafts out.
- Thermostat Set your thermostat 4-5°C lower when you are away and while you're sleeping. Better yet, get a programmable thermostat and set it to lower automatically.
- Furnace Replace your furnace filters regularly and keep your furnace tuned up so that it's working as efficiently as possible. If you're looking to replace your furnace, consider an Energy Star-qualified high efficiency furnace.

Edmonton Neighbourhood Foot Patrol Society (ENPS)

Edmonton Neighbourhood Foot Patrol Society is a society representing 20 individual community patrols in the city of Edmonton. As a society they provide assistance to community patrols for funding, screening and selection of volunteers, training and insurance coverage. Community patrols follow the same policy as outlined by the society. Patrols are foot based and structured around specific neighborhoods and often connected to the local community League. Individual community patrols are connected through the local EPS members who may choose to task the community patrol depending on workload and schedule. The Edmonton Police Service endorses all ENFPS groups. Community patrol groups do not work with an assigned member while on patrol and contact 911 or the complaint line when reporting suspicious or criminal activities.

The Edmonton Police Service endorses community patrol groups, which adhere to a specific policy for the purpose of ensuring that risks and liabilities to volunteers and the EPS have been addressed. Specifically, the EPS endorses those groups whose members have been appropriately screened, trained and insured for their duties. In addition the EPS endorses those groups who take an EYES and EARS approach to patrol and do not enter into confrontative situations or exercise Citizens' Power of Arrest.

Snow Shovelling Safety

Before you start:

- Dress properly for the weather before heading outdoors. Unprotected exposure to low temperatures and wind chill can result in hypothermia or frostbite.
- Dress in layers starting with a warm insulating inner layer; ending with wind and water proof outer layers. If you become too warm as you shovel, you can always remove outer layers as required.
- Wear proper footwear with a solid tread and adequate ankle support. Don't forget to wear a toque or hat to prevent heat loss from your head.
- Stay well hydrated by drinking plenty of water before and after you shovel. Avoid caffeinated beverages and alcoholic beverages as well as smoking. These all act as stimulants that can put a strain on your heart by constricting blood vessels and increasing heart rate. Caffeine can also promote dehydration – another important reason to avoid it. Alcoholic beverages do not act as a stimulant, but they also promote dehydration, impair your judgment, and make you more susceptible to the effects of the cold weather.
- Reduce the chance of injury by warming up your muscles with light exercise and stretching before you shovel. Warm muscles use energy more efficiently.

How to shovel:

- Choose the correct size of shovel for you. A smaller shovel will require you to lift less snow at a time and reduce the strain on your body.
- Protect your back by lifting properly: keep the shovel close to the body, stay balanced by standing with feet about hip-width apart, bend your knees, squatting with a straight back. As you lift the snow use your legs to provide the lift, tighten your stomach muscles to support your back, keep your back straight. Do not bend your back.
- When possible, push snow, don't lift it. Always orient your body in the same direction you are pushing the snow. If you need to move the snow to one side, reposition your entire body to continue facing the direction you are pushing.
- Do not throw snow over your shoulder or to the side. Most back injuries occur when you are in a twisted position. The injury can be made worse when you are bearing the weight of heavy snow as you twist.
- Don't extend your arms when maneuvering a full shovel of heavy snow as this puts excess strain on your back muscles and too much weight on your spine. Attempt to keep the weight of the shovel close to your body.
- Pace yourself and take a break, especially if there's been a heavy snowfall; don't try to clear it away all at once.

Hall Update with Questions and Answers

It's been awhile since the last hall project update. At the Nov. meeting, it was discussed that PRCL will reapply for the CFEP grant in March 2011. We hope by then we will know more on other factors that could assist with the project, such as the availability of capital funding from the City, a potential partnership with the Alberta Thai Association (ATA) and the potential sale of the Prince Rupert School. Until the next update, here are some questions and answers for those that are not as familiar with this hall project.

If I can't attend meetings, how do I still participate?

There is a lot of work in making a project of this size succeed. If you aren't able to attend meetings but still want to get involved, there are many ways to still be involved such as helping with fundraising, applying for grants, researching information, etc.

I live in Prince Rupert but seldom use the hall or have never used the hall. Why should I care about a new community hall?

Our mission is to serve the needs of the Prince Rupert Community League by providing accessible programs, events and activities for children, youths, adults, seniors and families in a central location. This central gathering location creates a sense of belonging and connection with one's neighbours and friends. Currently we're being as creative as we can to accomplish this feeling of community. However with the current state and size of our facility, we would be forced to rely on neighbouring communities within several years due to the costs to maintain what is already inadequate for our flourishing community. Thus, without a new hall, our strength, usefulness and value of a community would be weakened. To sum it up, we want to build a hall that can serve our community needs for now and for 40-50 years from now.

What will the new hall look like?

Will the new hall be energy efficient?

The concept design will allow for the community to build a hall the most efficient as possible but within our budget, such as thicker walls, better insulation, use of windows for natural lighting, energy efficient appliances, etc. Solar energy is a bit too pricey for the budget we're on, but in the future a retro-fit might be possible.

Will there be audiovisual equipment in the hall?

During the concept drawings this was discussed. Wiring and necessary space will be allotted for such things, so in the future when the community has more funds to spend on these items we can incorporate them easily. Hall users may bring their own equipment if required.

Where will the hall be located?

When we created the concept drawings, we planned for the hall to be built on the North side of the PRCL parking lot, towards the end of the rink by the Senior Slo-Pitch building. However there is a potential sale of the Prince Rupert School that we're waiting to hear about, as this would be more of an ideal location for the new hall in the center of the community. We hope to have more news regarding this in January from the EPSB.

What will it cost to rent the new hall?

This is yet to be determined and there will need to be more research done on this before we can create firm rates, especially if we have Alberta Thai Association interested in a potential partnership with PRCL.

Who is the Alberta Thai Association and what can they contribute to the project?

The Alberta Thai Association (ATA) is a non-profit organization located in Edmonton; its main purpose is to promote friendship, goodwill, and understanding within the Alberta Thai Community and Canadian society. ATA also provides opportunities for cultural, educational, recreational and social activities of its membership. See www.thaiassociation.ab.ca for details. ATA's activities include cooking, dancing and educational programming. Another goal of ATA is to provide a Thai Centre for its members, by providing a building. Given the large cost involved, the ATA Executive is very much in favour of exploring joint ownership of a new Hall with the Prince Rupert Community, through a long-term (10 years plus) partnership arrangement. Discussions are still in the very early stages.

What are the advantages of a partnership with ATA?

- A \$150,000 contribution towards a new hall
- Sharing of the operational costs
- A stable organization
- Similar values
- Potential access to additional programs for Prince Rupert CL members
- Maximization of Facility use
- Enhanced chances of securing Provincial and City Grants

What are the needs of the ATA?

- An expanded building to accommodate most of their events (with a main hall accommodating as many as 200 people)
- A larger, commercial kitchen for teaching and cooking (with commercial stoves and fridges)
- Storage area
- A small stage for music (it can be a portable one)
- An outside BBQ area (already in our future plans)
- Ample parking

What are our options if we don't raise enough money?

Consultation of the community would be done to determine if we continue to do necessary maintenance/repairs on existing facility and hope that it extends the life for a few more years. We do recommend renovations to the existing facility to bring it to City standards (which is quite costly to still have the exact same space that already doesn't serve us adequately). The other option is to remove old hall and have a very nice park.

What kind of programs, activities or events are you planning on having in the new hall?

We would like to provide many new programs, activities and events. Some ideas that have been brought up from residents and members in our community are yoga, dance, Christmas Crafts & Bake Sales, Plant sales, New Year's and Valentines events, Mother's Day Tea, cooking and baking classes, scrap booking nights, movie nights, art classes, moms & tots and other social activities that will help develop our sense of community. The new hall will also provide storage for equipment and supplies required for activities, programs and events that the community currently does but our current hall has trouble or can't support at the moment (such as storage for our rink equipment, BBQ, tables, tent, etc.).

New Superstore Coming to Prince Rupert

On Oct. 27 Prince Rupert Community League hosted a special meeting to gain more information regarding the Superstore development in our neighbourhood. Dallas and Daniel from Loblaw Companies Limited spoke about the plans and answered numerous questions about the new Superstore.

As you may have noticed, the parking lot has already been repaved by Superstore. Renovations to the old Save-On-Foods and adjoining furniture store will commence in December. The new Superstore is slated to open in June of 2011. Loblaws will honour the leases of the small businesses along the strip mall where Ricky's is located, so no major changes are expected in that area. There will be no gas bar (the old site has been remediated) and no new liquor store. We will get a smaller Superstore by their standards, approximately 95,000 sq feet, instead of the typical 120 to 140 thousand sq feet. The Loblaws reps promised a strong effort to provide us with a friendly, efficient service, and a community oriented business; they suggested we wait until the new Superstore has been up and running a couple of weeks or more, and then connect with the new store manager.

The new Superstore will have one main front entrance and there will be no vehicle access from 114 Ave. You will notice improvements in the nearby sidewalks and landscaping, with better access from the east side. Good lighting and security will be provided around the outside of the store. Hiring for the store will occur later in the project and if interested you can apply by visiting the website at www.loblaw.ca.

The Importance of Reporting Crime and Disorder Reg. #2919 Constable Reid NICHOL

The Christmas season is fast approaching and with that comes a rise in theft from vehicles. Theft from vehicle is a crime of opportunity and all too often, it is preventable.

It's very important to take some simple steps to protect your vehicle to limit your chances of becoming a victim of property crime.

In your vehicle:

- Do not store your Christmas purchases in plain view. Lock them in your trunk out of sight or better yet keep them with you when you are shopping. You never know if someone is watching you place those purchases in your vehicle and leaving it unattended.
- Do not leave your vehicle running unattended. All it takes is a few short seconds for someone to break the window and your vehicle to get stolen while your back is turned.
- Secure your vehicle properly. Purchase an invaluable steering wheel locking mechanism or an alarm system.
- It is never acceptable to leave you children unattended in your vehicle.
- Remove all personal items from your vehicle.

In your home:

- Secure valuables in a lock box or safety deposit box.
- Close curtains in your living room especially during the evening so that you cannot see the mound of gifts under the Christmas tree.
- After Christmas do not publicize your gifts. The boxes you leave out in the alley for garbage pickup only entice the property criminal and let him/her know what you have inside your home. Break down the boxes and turn them inside out so that you cannot see what it is.
- Record and keep a list of serial numbers for big-ticket items and keep the list in a safe place in your home.
- If you're away for the holidays have someone check on your home, shovel the snow and collect the mail so that it looks like someone is still home.
- If you have a home alarm, make use of it and make sure that your supplemental key holder information is up to date and that they have an actual key to your house.
- Be responsible for your personal property and safety. By being proactive and taking simple steps to protect yourself and your property you limit the chances of becoming a victim of crime.
